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



> Étienne Balibar is <u>Distinguished Professor of French</u>, <u>Italian and Comparative Literature</u> at the University of California Irvine. His interest in ideology, conjuncture (referring to economic and political aspects of a situation causing friction), and Marxism as philosophy pairs with his commitment to examining as well as influencing the lived reality of politics, focusing on emancipation and what he terms equaliberty. The breadth of his thought can be gauged from his published works ranging from Lire le capital (Reading Capital) which he co-authored in 1965 with his mentor Louis Althusser, We, the People of Europe? Reflections on Transnational Citizenship (2003), and Equaliberty: Political Essays (2014).

Alain Badiou is Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at the École Normal Supérieure in Paris. One of France's most famous philosophers, he emphasizes that in order to have a hold on reality, philosophy must encompass revolt, logic, universality, and risk. He demonstrates the ongoing pertinence of theory and political practice inspired by Marxism and attacks established schools of thought such as hermeneutics and (post-)structuralism. Convinced that philosophical writing of the past fifty years has been too concerned with language, he introduces mathematics into the picture. Amongst his most influential works are Ethics: An Essay on the Understanding of Evil (2004), Being and Event (2005), and Logics of Worlds: Being and Event II (2009).

Hans Ulrich Gumbrecht is the Albert Guérard Professor in Literature in the Departments of Comparative Literature and of French & Italian at Stanford University. As a public intellectual and highly prolific writer, he contributes to fields as diverse as the histories of national literatures in Romance languages, western philosophical traditions, or forms of aesthetic experience in 21st-century everyday culture. His latest books include Atmosphere, Mood, Stimmung: On a Hidden Potential of Literature (2012), Explosionen der Aufklärung. Diderot, Goya, Lichtenberg, Mozart (2013), and After 1945: Latency as Origin of the Present (2013).
